Special Topics in Medicine and Society ("the summer sociomedical course") will begin Monday, June 11, 1984, and continue through Friday, August 3, 1984. The course is listed as Sociology 396; students register for a lecture/discussion section and a lab/practicum section which together total 6 hours or 2 units and constitute a full summer session courseload. The course meets Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. until 12 noon in 356B Medical Sciences Building. Requirements for the course include passing a midterm and final examination, completing a final project, and participating in a series of lab/practicum experiences including a two-day clinical practicum in Chicago.

A current course description and last year's summer schedule is on the back of this memo. This summer's schedule, a syllabus, lecture outline, and reading list are in preparation.

I will be happy to talk with you about the course--goals, content, and where it might best fit into your own individual schedule.
